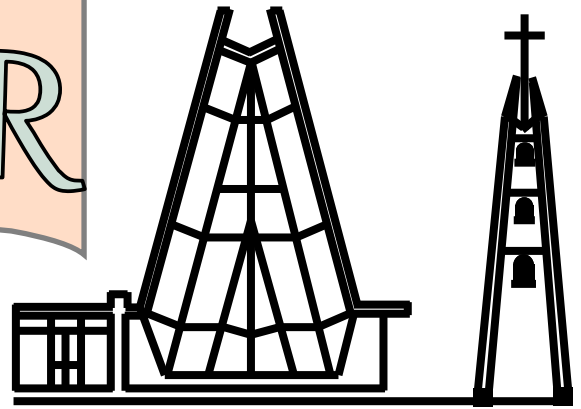

## *Looking inside Lent*

Lent is a time in the church year when we can slow down and look inside for those parts of ourselves we need God's help to heal. People most frequently talk about uncovering sins and habits of thought and deed that lead us to sin. We can also use this time to increase our awareness of our emotional states and really feel the joy, pain, and sadness or fear that is present. So much of contemporary culture is designed to help us avoid feeling—we dull our physical pain and distract ourselves from our emotions. We need to really know ourselves and understand the sources of pain and unhealthiness in our lives if we are going to ask the Lord to come in and wash us clean again.

The Lord wants us to be healthy and whole. When we are whole and living in harmony, we can build that world full of love and compassion that Christ asks us to inhabit. Take a risk this Lenten season and bare your soul to the Lord and to yourself, trusting that God will never leave you or forsake you and trusting that *you are worth knowing*. Increased self-knowledge and awareness of our weaknesses prepares us to better love our neighbor.

## ELCA presiding bishop responds to attacks on Jewish community

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

These famous words attributed to the German Lutheran pastor Martin Niemöller have been on my lips in recent days: *"Then they came for the Jews, and I did not speak out – because I was not a Jew. ... Then they came for me – and there was no one left to speak for me."*

In the face of anti-Semitism, we are called to speak out – as an expression of our love of neighbor and as our faithful response to the love of God in Jesus. In doing so, we become ambassadors of hope in the face of despair, imitators of Christ.

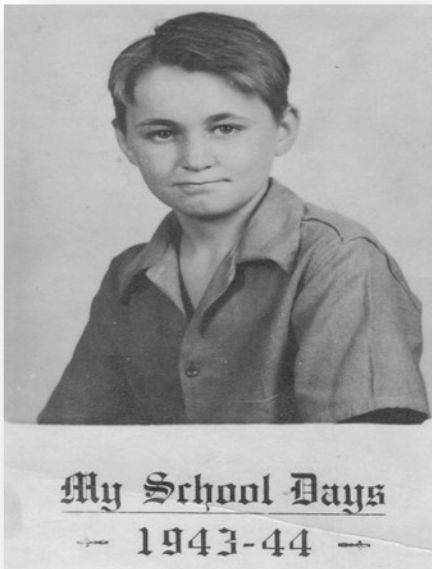
Our Jewish neighbors are once again living under threats, fearful for their safety and security. Over the weekend, a Jewish cemetery in St. Louis was desecrated, and on Monday, another wave of bomb threats was made to Jewish community centers across the country. This was at least the fourth round this year alone. As Christians, we affirm that Jews remain "beloved of God" and that an attack on them is an attack on those whom our God – the one God – has called "my people."

In many places, with leadership from across this church, we are reaching out and showing up with our Jewish neighbors, often with ecumenical and inter-religious partners. We can and should continue and expand these important ministries of presence.

There is also the critical long-term work. As a church, in our 1994 Declaration to the Jewish Community, we have pledged "to oppose the deadly working of such bigotry, both within our own circles and in the society around us." This will not happen quickly. It will take concerted efforts to correct "the complicity of our own tradition within this history of hatred" and to seek deeper mutual understanding and cooperation between Lutheran Christians and the Jewish community. So, let us continue to speak out, to reach out, to show up, and to root out this deadly bigotry of anti-Semitism. For the courage to do God's will, and for the peace of our Jewish neighbors, we pray.

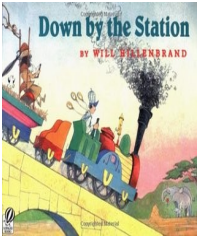

## No Winter Doldrums at Hilltop!

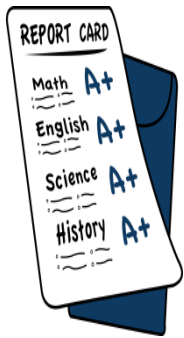
Some of us may be experiencing the late winter doldrums, but such is not the case at the Hilltop Lutheran Neighborhood Center.



Our Early Childhood Development classes certainly have NO doldrums! They are working with a lesson titled “Vroom, Vroom!” The books in the plan include *Traffic*, *Sylvia’s Garage*, and *Down By the Station*. Center Education Coordinator, Heather Fortney says the theme “focusses on different types of transportation and how and when each are used.”

Meanwhile, at the other end of the age spectrum, Youth Services Director, Matthew Johnson reports the Jr. NBA program has “started off with a bang!” In addition, Matt says “I am currently trying to ensure that all of the kids that want to participate can.” More teams had to be added as the number of kids flocking to the center to take part keeps increasing. And that’s a good thing. Also for the older kids, Matt restarted the “Boys to Men” program. This program “will continue to teach and empower our young men to be more civic minded and educationally focused.”

Speaking of education, if I’m not mistaken, we are in the third marking period of the school year and that means school visits and review of report cards. Both efforts focus on how the Center can assist students with identifying weak knowledge areas and establishing ways to improve them. Center Assistant Education Coordinator, Courtney Grey, has that responsibility and reports “significant progress with scheduling school visits” and working with the individual students.



Clubs have been a mainstay of Center activities almost since its inception over 50 years ago, and 2017 is no different. In the spotlight this month is the Cooking Club which has been experimenting with Brazilian Cheese Bread. In this case, the cooking was linked with a discussion about the history and culture of Brazil as the kids baked and shared their knowledge with each other. Sounds both fun and yummy!

**Oldlutheran.com** says, "Whether you plan to "Give up" something or "take on" something we have created a seven part resource with the theme '**Give it up for Lent**'."

Seven words each with a slightly different look at what it means to "Give it up." Of course we have a "Give it up" T-shirt but we also have buttons that you can give to your study group, congregation or during a children's service. Each button has a different word that can be the theme of the week or part of a seven week Bible Study. Dig in, and discover what it means to "**Give it up**".

***Give up. Refrain. Engage. Retreat. Sacrifice. Let Go. Thanksgiving. Accept.***

Here is just a little start for you to dream, study and prepare to *Give it up for Lent*.

**Refrain.** We can for a brief time in our life "give up" some vice or practice for a period of time. Perhaps we could refrain from drinking coffee for seven weeks so we better experience the joy or energy that it gives us when we drink it again on Easter Sunday. We refrain from eating dessert or drinking alcohol or watching television.

**Engage.** Another way would be to give it up in all caps with an explanation point as in to get really excited. GIVE IT UP! Lent is here and we can as a community of believers gather together and celebrate this often somber season in the church year. It could be completely possible to CELEBRATE Lent with our whole heart while we remain quite and contemplative.

**Retreat.** What if we were to evaluate our lives and realize that we fight or resist a regiment of prayer and the use of scripture as a tool to experience our life of faith. What if we "Give up" the fight and actually spend more time in prayer or intentional relationship with God.

**Sacrifice.** Different than giving up sweets or caffeine, sometimes we take life's comforts for granted. It is more difficult but could be much more poignant to actually sacrifice so that we can better understand those without such comforts. Could consider giving up" hot showers or warm blankets or your car for a time to experience the life of those less privileged?

**Let Go.** Stress can be a badge of honor as we go through our daily lives. We can with great satisfaction proclaim that life is hard and I am muscling through. Imagine rather than embracing or enduring through stressful situations actually "Giving it up" to God in prayer.

**Thanksgiving.** We live in a do it yourself society. We are quick to accept the credit for our successes and accomplishments. What if it became more common place to "Give up" the credit to God. Recognize daily that day to day activities are a result of God given abilities.

**Accept.** Sometimes we need to be challenged to "give up" our prejudice or bias that keep us from experiencing a broader more diverse community.

However you "**Give it up!**" this year, be it avoiding, experiencing or retreating, we hope that these weeks leading up to the resurrection will fill your soul and guide you to "The peace that passes all understanding."
